The Options Process

Dear Parents/Carers

Your son/daughter is approaching an important stage in their secondary education. With the beginning of Key Stage 4 only two terms away, it is now necessary for us all to support our Year 9 pupils as they consider which optional subjects to study. The amount of choice available is both exciting and daunting; consequently, having access to high quality information, advice and guidance is crucial. This booklet aims to introduce you to the Options process at Ss John Fisher and Thomas More RC High School and the support that we will be offering.

The Key Stage 4 Options process has now started with an extended assembly and the issue of a Key Stage 4 Options booklet. There is also a digital Key Stage 4 subject information booklet which is available through the school website. In addition, there will be an Options Information Evening for pupils and parents/carers where information about the Key Stage 4 options process will be explained.

Monday 20 th March 2023	Option choices finalised and final option forms to be issued to pupils.
Thursday 23 rd March 2023	Final option forms to be completed and returned to school.

Key Stage 4 Curriculum

The curriculum at Key Stage 4 is comprised of two parts:

1. Six **compulsory** core qualifications
2. Three additional **selected** qualifications.

All subjects allow for access to post-16 routes and combine to construct a curriculum that meets the needs of every learner.

The pupils will follow a two-week timetable (50 periods over the two weeks) and the table below shows the number of lessons the pupils will have of each subject over the two weeks.

Plus, one 50-minute PSHCE lesson each week.

Part 1 – Compulsory Core Subjects

Our core curriculum comprises **six GCSE qualifications that are compulsory for every pupil:**

- **Religious Education** – 1 GCSE Award, Grade 9-1
- **English Language** – 1 GCSE Award, Grade 9-1
- **English Literature** – 1 GCSE Award, Grade 9-1
- **Mathematics** – 1 GCSE Award, Grade 9-1
- **Combined Science** – 2 GCSE Awards, Grade 9-1

Plus

- **Core PE** – Core PE is a non-examined course.
- **PSHCE** – non-examined course.

Part 2 – Option choices

Pupils also select **three additional qualifications**.

The additional courses we offer are summarised below:

N.B. Pupils taking Additional Science will finish their core Science and Additional Science courses with 3 separate awards – Biology, Chemistry and Physics.

Also, the ASDAN – Personal and Social Effectiveness qualification will be for selected pupils who require additional support.

Making the Choice!

- i. Pupils MUST choose 1 subject from Group A.**
- ii. Pupils may then choose a further 2 subjects from Group A and Group B combined.**
- iii. Pupils should choose 2 reserve subjects from Group A or Group B.**

**Pupils cannot choose both Art and Graphic Communication
– one or the other.**

**Pupils cannot choose both Computer Science and Digital IT
– one or the other**

Pupils are advised to choose one technology subject – either Food Preparation and Nutrition or Graphic Communication.

These choices will need to be filled in on the separate Choices form and signed by a parent/carer.

A Guide to the Qualifications

There have been many recent changes to the education system resulting in reformed GCSEs, a different grade system and new qualifications. Fisher More proudly offers a diverse range of qualifications at Key Stage 4 to ensure that the curriculum is truly broad, balanced and relevant.

Here is an outline of how the different qualifications are assessed and awarded:

GCSE Qualifications

Award: Level 2 courses

- 9 – 1 scale; with grade 9 being the highest grade.
- The content of the reformed GCSEs is more challenging, especially at the higher grades – hence the introduction of grade 9 in particular.
- Fewer grade 9s are awarded compared to the previous top grade of A* (Current equivalent grade 8).
- A grade 5 is the equivalent of a strong C grade in the old system and is known as a strong pass a grade 4 is the equivalent of a lower C grade and known as a standard pass.
- Most GCSEs are now fully assessed through examinations at the end of Year 11, there are no coursework requirements usually.

BTEC Qualifications

Award: Level 2 courses

- Equivalent to GCSE grades (Level 2 is Equivalent to Grade 4-9).
- Assessed differently to GCSEs with a focus on measuring skills as well as recall ability.
- Increased vocational element to components.
- Significantly fewer final exams – BTECs are also assessed through assignments.
- Leads to career opportunities through Level 3 BTECs at post-16 level as well as adding to your 'basket' of qualifications for other routes.
- Recognised by colleges, industry and the professional sector.

What is the EBacc?

The EBacc is not a qualification in its own right – it is a combination of GCSE subjects, including a language, that offer a, pre-determined, range of knowledge and skills to young people.

Schools are now scrutinised by several different measures of performance and the number of pupils studying subjects that make up the full EBacc is one of them.

What are the EBacc subjects?

The Department for Education stipulates the specific subjects that pupils must study as part of the full EBacc.

If a pupil selected the following subjects at Fisher More they would meet the EBacc requirements:

- English language **and** English literature (Core curriculum)
- Maths (Core curriculum)
- Science: either Combined Science (Core curriculum) **or** Triple Science
- History **or** Geography
- Spanish (**or** other languages studied as an extra-curricular subject)

Why are Languages included in the EBacc?

Studying a foreign language can be challenging but also extremely rewarding and exciting. They provide an insight into other cultures and can also broaden pupils' horizons, helping them flourish in new environments.

If your child finds languages difficult, remember that they will have been studying them for much less time than their other subjects and learning a language has the potential to greatly enhance an individual's future opportunities. Employers also value languages, as they are increasingly important to make sure we can compete in the global market. Because of this, languages are increasingly becoming a requirement for graduate schemes.

Do I need the EBacc to go to University?

The EBacc is certainly valued by Britain's most prestigious universities but most universities have no universal entry requirements in terms of specific GCSEs. All or most universities will require a pupil to have gained a strong pass in English and Maths at GCSE but other than that subject choice is ultimately more important at post-16 stages of education.

Making the Right Decision

How do I choose my Options?

- Approach the process with an open mind and listen to staff carefully to make informed decisions about which subjects you might enjoy and would be able to achieve well in. Your teachers are the experts on the courses they deliver – there is a list of Subject Leaders on the next page.
- Make the most of the Individual Advice and Guidance Interview that you will each be allocated. You will receive guidance regarding the range of qualifications that offer the highest positive outcomes for you as a learner.
- Evaluate your strengths and what you find challenging and consider which courses offer you the highest potential final outcomes enabling you to achieve your future goals.
- Do not choose a course because your friends have chosen it, you like the teacher, it sounds easy or you cannot think of anything else. Key Stage 4 is the time to prioritise your own learning, you may be taught by another teacher, none of the options are 'easy' and if you need help deciding then we are here to help.

Who should I speak to for more information?

If you have specific questions about particular courses at Key Stage 4 you should approach the Subject Leader who will be happy to provide the information you require.
