The new year at Fisher More is filled with opportunities to explore, learn, and grow. We encourage all pupils to participate and make the most of these wonderful activities!

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
TEACHER FEATURE: A Chat with Mrs. Helliwell, Leading the Way in Religious Education

HEALTH AND WELLBEING



Hi there! I am Barbara the Health and Wellbeing Support Manager for Fisher More High School.

I was a paediatric nurse for the NHS and have worked in the community setting as part of the school nurse team. I am proud to say that I have completed 25 years in these roles, and now I am able to put all my experiences and achievements into the position I now undertake within school.

It's estimated that 1 in 6 young people in the UK have a diagnosable mental health problem.

Statistics also suggest that 50% of people that suffer from ongoing mental health problems experience their first symptoms by the age of 14.

It's important to make sure that the right education, advice and support around mental wellness is readily available to young people.

Well-being is the experience of health and happiness. It includes mental and physical health, physical and emotional safety, and a feeling of belonging, sense of purpose, achievement and success.

Well-being is a broad concept and covers a range of psychological and physical abilities. Five major types of wellbeing are said to be:

- Emotional well-being the ability to be resilient, manage one's emotions and generate emotions that lead to good feelings
- Physical well-being the ability to improve the functioning of one's body through healthy eating and good exercise habits
- Social well-being the ability to communicate, develop meaningful relationships with others and create one's own emotional support network
- Workplace well-being the ability to pursue one's own interests, beliefs and values in order to gain meaning and happiness in life and professional enrichment
- Societal well-being the ability to participate in an active community or culture.

What is a school wellbeing worker?

MAIN PURPOSE OF JOB: To provide a high-quality counselling service to pupils experiencing a wide range of emotional problems. To work collaboratively with school staff, pupils, parents / carers and external agencies etc. in raising the health, welfare and well-being of children and young people at the school.

CORE RESPONSIBILITIES AND DUTIES:

- To provide a high-quality counselling service to pupils experiencing a wide range of emotional problems.
- To be responsible for maintaining appropriate and confidential records.
- To provide regular audit information such as numbers, age range and types of problems to the relevant member of staff.
- Develop, deliver and co-ordinate a comprehensive emotional support and well-being programme for pupils who experience certain difficulties which create barriers to their learning.
- To provide support, guidance and advice to parents, carers and school, on matters relating to emotional health, welfare and well-being.
- To have a thorough knowledge of the Mental Health provision locally and nationally
- To continually review and evaluate the service.
- Responsibility for assessments of emotional well-being and joint working with CAMHS, CAMHS Crisis Team and other external agencies.
- Deliver and evaluate mental health / welfare related workshops for identified pupils.
- To provide advice on health promotion to pupils, parents/ carers and staff.
- To be committed to Continuing Professional Development and to keep up to date with national and local issues which effect the social, emotional and mental health of young people and issues relating to their education.
- To take a proactive approach towards managing own work and caseload. This may occasionally require working outside normal office hours.
- To maintain up to date records in accordance with agreed procedures and to provide written and verbal reports for monitoring and evaluation purposes.

How can schools promote emotional wellbeing?

By supporting pupils to better understand their own mental health, how to take care of it and how to talk about it, schools and colleges can encourage more open discussions and help break down any stigma around mental health. providing access to a range of reading materials that discuss mental health and wellbeing.

As we embrace the festive season, it's important to consider the unique needs of our autistic youngsters. This year, help Fisher More High School by adopting inclusive strategies to ensure a joyful and comfortable holiday experience for all.

Rebecca, Robbie, Aiden, Leuan and Lucy share their top tips for how everyone can make the festive season more inclusive for autistic people.

- "Dim the lights and have a quiet area." Robbie
- "Explain to me what type of present I will be receiving, for example a craft kit or food." Lucy
- "It helps to work up to the full Christmas arrangement, for example by eating together more frequently before the actual day." Aiden
- "Don't force autistic people, or anyone, to do something and let them have a rest or quiet time if needed." Rebecca
- "I need access to sensory spaces if I am overstimulated." Leuan
- "Please don't play loud music in public areas." Lucy
- "Keep Christmas lights and decoration to a minimum. If this cannot happen, have at least one room (at home, school or the workplace) that doesn't have any Christmas decorations that an autistic person can go to if they need to get away from everything." Rebecca
- "We leave Christmas decorations up for a bit longer after one Christmas, we even just kept up some LED lights around the house to make it easier to walk around the house in the dark!" Aiden
- "I ensure I take time for myself to recharge my energy after doing more things than usual." Leuan
- "In advance of Christmas parties or events either at work on in school, talk through the changes that are going to be to happening with the autistic person so they can prepare and suggest changes if necessary." Rebecca
- "Try to limit flashing lights at home." Lucy
- "I ask people what they want and tell them if there's anything that I want for Christmas and have defaults to fall back on." Aiden
